### Petronas plans to expand energy industries into Australia by 2030

Petronas has unveiled plans to build a portfolio of up to 8GW of solar, wind and storage capacity in Australia, as part of a massive global push into renewables, through its offshoot company Gentari Solar Australia.

"Our targets are ambitious," Gentari CEO Sushil Purohit said at the launch in September. The company's chief renewable office, Kian Min Low, says the company plans to build up to 40GW of renewables capacity around the world, pretty much from a standing start of just 3GW now. The plans include big investments in India, Malaysia, and between 5GW and 8GW of renewables and storage capacity in Australia, with a mix of green fields development and buying existing assets.

Gentari also plans to build a green hydrogen production platform that will produce 1.2 million tonnes a year, and it has ambitions to grab a 10 per cent share of the EV charging market in the Asia-Pacific region.

"It's a big leap ... but we want to make a change and make a difference," Low told RenewEconomy at the launch. "It is a very large target ... everybody acknowledges that. And we will have to get there, like I said, through both organic and inorganic means."



Gentari Solar Australia currently has 422 MW in gross installed capacity and 765 MW in its "near term" pipeline of projects, including two solar and battery projects at Maryvale, near Wellington, in New South Wales and Barnawartha in Victoria.

## What are O'Brien Palmer's aspirations to grow, nationally and perhaps internationally?

OBP operates predominantly from its Sydney CBDbased office, supplemented by another office in Bathurst in regional NSW. However, the firm's serviceability extends beyond NSW, having been engaged on various interstate matters. Whilst OBP is looking to continue growing its existing NSWbased practice, the firm is considering expanding its operations, in the first instance, to the neighbouring states in the near future.

Given the insolvency climate between Australia and the Asia Pacific region is not dissimilar, and because a number of major players in the industry, who are predominantly based in Australia, have established themselves well in the Asia Pacific region, OBP sees great potential in developing its capability to operate on cross-border advisory work which has traditionally been the domain of national or multi-national firms, whilst still offering the advantages of working with a SME enterprise.

#### What are some opportunities and challenges for businesses (particularly in your industry) operating across the Australian and Asia Pacific (including Malaysia) markets?

There has been an increase in cross-border insolvency involving Australia-based businesses or individuals with parent entities, subsidiaries or associated entities, business interest generally and asset holdings overseas, notably in the Asia Pacific region, and vice versa.

From a compliance point of view, cross-border insolvency can be complicated. However, several insolvency and advisory practices, both locally and internationally (notably in Malaysia, Singapore, China and Hong Kong) have been able to convert this challenge into a golden opportunity to expand their operations overseas. One of OBP's vision is to be able to capitalise on the ongoing need for cross-border insolvency and strive to make a name for the firm beyond the Australian markets.



It aims to do so by taking advantage of the firm's decades-long experience in the industry and robust relationships established with legal and accounting services providers, to tackle and reduce the complexity associated with multinational businesses and individuals looking to undergo restructuring, financial rehabilitation or an orderly wind down of operations and wind up of affairs.
